Only 2 sources of funding

- Who is paying for road infrastructure?
 - Taxpayers
 - General budget
 - Dedicated or sectorial taxes (gas tax)
 - Users, through tolls and vignettes



Many funding needs to come

- Adapting existing infrastructures for new mobilities
 - Shared mobilities
 - Reserved lanes
 - Park and Ride
 - Multimodal facilities
 - Electric mobility
 - Automated and connected cars
 - Free flow tolling
- Existing funding will not meet the demand
 - Current network maintenance barely funded
 - Budget constraints not likely to soften










User-pay principle needs to prevail


- Under budgetary constraints, government seldom gives priority to roads
 - New investments are differed
 - Maintenance of existing network at risk
- Sustainability of existing funding at risk

 Gas tax and decarbonation
- User pay models more sustainable?
 - Earmarking of resources is a clear asset
 - Consensus on tolling always difficult to maintain
 - Tolling schemes "enhancements" may threaten existing tolling schemes
 - Tariff increases more and more contested

Private concession are a powerful financing too

- Contracts implies commitment
- Win-win contracts
- State still the main beneficiary of tolling
- Tariffs under control






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Flexible tool enabling investments
